Fiction has become nearly synonymous with literature itself, as if Homer and Dante and Pynchon were all engaged in the same basic activity. But one difficulty with this view is simply that a literature trafficking in openly invented characters is a quite recent development. Novelists before the nineteenth century ceaselessly asserted that their novels were true stories, and before that, poets routinely took their basic plots and heroes from the past. We have grown accustomed to thinking of the history of literature and the novel as a progression from the ideal to the real. Yet paradoxically, the modern triumph of realism is also the triumph of a literature

that has shed all pretense to literalness. Before Fiction: The Ancien Régime of the Novel offers a new understanding of the early history of the genre in England and France, one in which writers were not slowly discovering a type of fictionality we now take for granted but rather following a distinct set of practices and rationales. Nicholas D. Paige reinterprets Lafayette's *La Princesse de Clèves*, Rousseau's *Julie, ou la Nouvelle Héloïse*, Diderot's *La Religieuse*, and other French texts of the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries in light of the period's preoccupation with literal truth. Paige argues that novels like these occupied a place before fiction, a pseudofactual realm that in no way leads to modern realism. The book provides an alternate way of looking at a familiar history, and in its very idiom and methodology charts a new course for how we should study the novel and think about the evolution of cultural forms.

Inwiefern hüllt Denis Diderot sein aufklärerisches Gedankengut in seine Erzählung ein? Welche Möglichkeiten zur Auseinandersetzung im Französischunterricht bieten sich an? Das Erzählen als "l'expression la plus parfaite de tous nos récits oraux" ist vermutlich eine der ältesten Formen des Dialogs und bis heute fest verankert in der (domestizierten) Alltäglichkeit der Menschen. Wer erzählt, möchte eine Information teilen, eine Botschaft transportieren. Aus rein literaturwissenschaftlicher Perspektive handelt es sich dabei um einen Vorgang des "Darstellen[s] einer nicht-zufälligen Ereignisfolge, oft durch eine Vermittlungsinstanz, den Erzähler". Die Funktionen dieser Handlung sind ebenso vielfältig wie die Art und Weisen des Erzählens selbst und bewegen sich insofern in einem Kontinuum zwischen trivialer Einschlafhilfe und kollektiver Identitätsstiftung. Das Erzählen respektive die Erzählung, deren Grenzen zum Roman fließend sind, hat insofern die polyvalente Fähigkeit zu beruhigen, zu unterhalten, zu erinnern und/oder zu lehren. Die letztgenannte Fähigkeit steht im Hinblick auf das in dieser Arbeit verhandelte Werk im Vordergrund. Denn die Erzählung "Les deux amis de Bourbonne" aus dem Jahre 1770 ist zweifelsfrei geprägt von dem

aufklärerischen Geist ihres Autors, dem französischen Schriftsteller und Philosophen Denis Diderot. Während des Jahrhundertwechsels, welcher dem Werk vorausging, kristallisierte sich nämlich eine ansteigende Beliebtheit im Hinblick auf die Textsorte der Erzählung heraus, weshalb Diderots "Les deux amis de Bourbonne" in aristokratischen Leserkreisen in ganz Europa rezipiert wurde und für diese Untersuchung als äußerst ergiebig eingeschätzt wird. Originally published in 2000, this book highlights the interest Sedaine's life and work is now, belatedly, provoking in many scholarly disciplines. If Sedaine speaks today to literary history, theatre history and opera studies, it is because he possessed a multivalent vision, one which accounts for both his past neglect and is present rediscovery. Like many others, he believed that the established, 'official' genres needed to be reformed; unlike many, he made it his business to transform the actual language and operation of the theatre arts he practised. Until late eighteenth-century opera and drama in France become better understood, Sedaine's immense importance for the development of Romantic opera and theatre risks remaining generally concealed; to reveal something of this importance is one

main reason for publishing the present volume. This book includes chapters on Sedaine and the question of genre, the representation of the female in the dramas of Sedaine, and the words, gestures and other signs in the era of Sedaine.

Writers who mystify operate through paradox: their lies point toward truth, and their obfuscations reveal trickery. This conundrum is the foundation for Learning from Lying, which defines mystification as a literary form that seeks to enlighten by means of deception. Learning from Lying narrates a new literary history as seen through the lens of mystification. Beginning with

an examination of mystification's elaboration during the century of Enlightenment, the book accounts for mystification's distinctiveness relative to other deceptive forms, particularly forgery, and provides a timely intervention in current debates about the study of fakes. Readings of works by Denis Diderot, Prosper Merimee, and Wolfgang Hildesheimer follow out the cosmopolitan roots of the genre in the Republic of Letters and show how it theorizes literature through practical experiment. For when textual imitation is revealed, it unveils the necessary collusion between reader and writer that allows literature to exist as such.

Contrary to what might be expected from a philosophical novel, Sterne and Diderot do not impose their own views upon the reader. The author's voice is but one amongst many others. Margaux Whiskin's argument hinges on Bakhtinian dialogism, which can be defined as the presence of interacting voices and views. In *Tristram Shandy* and *Jacques le fataliste*, dialogism occurs through the narrative structure allowing for the confrontation of the contradictory discourses in the philosophical debates, and enabling them to engage in dialogue, instead of establishing the authorial voice as the sole valid discourse in the text. Through those contradictions, the philosophical content takes on a different form, that of a refusal of systematic discourse. Sterne and Diderot do not offer a solution to the various questions debated in their novels. However, they do offer a philosophical approach whereby the confrontation of contradictory ideas creates a dynamic for the pursuit of truth. By engaging in dialogue and

constantly opening questions where there is no single right answer, Sterne and Diderot redirect the focus of the reader and invite him to perceive truth not as a destination to be reached, or as a closed conclusion, but as being present in the quest itself, in the ongoing dialogues and debates. This is an interesting group to look at, according to Crocker, because French Enlightenment thinkers straddled two vastly different time periods.

The great eighteenth-century French thinker Denis Diderot (1713–84) once compared himself to a weathervane, by which he meant that his mind was in constant motion. In an extraordinarily diverse career he produced novels, plays, art criticism, works of philosophy and poetics, and also reflected on music and opera. Perhaps most famously, he ensured the publication of the *Encyclopédie*, which has often been credited with hastening the onset of the French Revolution. Known as one of the

three greatest philosophes of the Enlightenment, Diderot rejected the Christian ideas in which he had been raised. Instead, he became an atheist and a determinist. His radical questioning of received ideas and established religion led to a brief imprisonment, and for that reason, no doubt, some of his subsequent works were written for posterity. This collection of essays celebrates the life and work of this extraordinary figure as we approach the tercentenary of his birth.

Having slept with a prostitute in Egypt, a young French novelist named Gustave Flaubert at last abandons sentimentality and begins to write. Not only was he very close to Diderot - of whom he was biographer and editor - but he was also a privileged witness of the countless political, social and cultural events that led to the French Revolution. Besides being a convinced atheist, a tireless publisher, a fine connoisseur of Clandestine literature, Naigeon had the opportunity to collaborate in writing the last volumes of the Encyclopédie and to

participate in the propagation of heterodox, materialistic and fiercely anti-clerical writings. After the Revolution - at the beginning of which he tried in vain to make himself heard by the Assemblée Nationale - he was then integrated into

the "official" culture through the election at the Institut de France: however, even if he is the author of some prestigious works, Naigeon remains exclusively the living testimony of a now unrepeatabe cultural season.
